5.	Where is it now?
6.	When was it written?
7.	When did you discover it?

9.	IMPORTANT - Name every person in the document and their relationship. For example: John Doe (a witness), or Sue Smith (Bride), Steven Coe (County Clerk).
10.	What evidence/data within this item is a primary source (regarding your research question)?
11.	What evidence/data within this item is a secondary source (regarding your research question)?
