How to Create a Family Tree for *Free* on Ancestry.com

Video Link

I created a free family tree on Ancestry where I was able to confirm ancestors back six generations into the mid 1700's. That's 153 ancestors (not descendants) in my tree, in just two days, for free! This was not a free trial. There was no credit card required. There is no time limit. This is truly a free tree.



The bonus to all of this is that you have total control over your tree. No one can change it. This is not the same as a collaborative tree. It's your tree (unless you choose to share it with someone else).

There are limitations to a free account at Ancestry. I'll share those limitations here too.

I'm going to show you how I did it. Follow these steps and links below.

Create a Free GUEST Account

Again, this is not a free trial; it is a free guest account. There's a difference. Few people know about this option at Ancestry. Click here to register for a free guest account.

ncestrv® Account

Free Registered Guest Accounts

A registered guest account is a free Ancestry® account. If you've never had a membership or your membership has ended you have a registered guest account

Create a free account

Membership options

Because registered guest accounts are free, there's no need to cancel them; you will never be billed for a free registered guest account. Simply discontinue use whenever you'd like

All Ancestry accounts require an email address, and the same email address may be used with only one Ancestry account. If you don't have an email address, or if your email address is shared and is already connected to an Ancestry account, you'll need to create a new email address to create your own Ancestry account.

Follow the Wizard: Build a Tree with What You Know First


Adding a tree is simple just follow the prompts that Ancestry gives you to get started. Put all the information you know. The more you put in the Ancestry tree (than you know), the more accurate will be the hints Ancestry delivers back to you.

What you Can and Cannot See in Hints

Ancestry is going to deliver the same hints that they would any paying subscriber. However, some record details, you will not be able to see. But looking at the hints and indexes will provide clues as to whether these are your ancestors or not. Looking at just the hint information can provide a lot of detail.

Ancestry will provide you with other member tree hints. However, you will not be able to drill in and see them without a paid subscription.

While you *can* see all the hints, a clue that you *won't* be able to drill in and see the actual record (behind the paywall) is when portions of the data are blurred out. No worries, we have workarounds to see some of these records, keep reading.



Records You Can Search for Free

There are thousands of records you can research for free on Ancestry. <u>Go here</u> and scroll down to see them all.

U.S. States & Indexes

There are indexes from at least 39 U.S. states and territories. I counted them!

There are hundreds of records and free indexes, they often provide plenty of information to determine if they are your ancestors form all around the world.


Free Country Indexes or Records

There are thousands of free-to-search records from around the world, too many to name. Many of them are indexes with enough information for you to confirm your family.

Some of the indexes include (in no particular order) are: **Denmark, Wales, England, Australia, France, Germany, Russia, Austria, Belarus, Belgium, Brazil, Moldovia, Scotland, Romania, Hungary, Ireland, Canada, Israel, Italy, Poland, Lithuania, Netherlands, New Zealand, Tasmania, Ukraine, Iceland, Portugal, Slovakia and Switzerland.... just to name a few. There are many more.**

Chasing Hints

Chasing hints from any ancestor's profile, you can see thumbnails of many of the records and member added images along with some details. You will need a paid subscription to drill in and see them closer, but at least there is a hint of what is there. You might find it somewhere else, like Find-A-Grave, FamilySearch, Geneanet, National, State, and Local Archives, etc.



Find-A-Grave


If you find a reference to a record on Ancestry to Find-A-Grave, you often can't click through... but you

can go to <u>Find-A-Grave.com</u> and search for the same information you found on Ancestry. *Find-A-Grave is free to use.*

Searching Member Trees or Not!

This information is useful should you decide to start a free trial, and that is connecting with other members who are researching the same ancestors. While you can search for other member trees and see some details, contacting other members is not allowed with the free guest account.

Ancestry says you can "initiate a message" to anyone on their platform under the free guest account, it can't be done by searching the members or from the Member Connect page, I tried.



Searching Public and Private Trees

Below are two options for researching public and private trees. This may provide clues, but ultimately you will need a paid subscription if you wish to contact other members.

With your free guest account...

You can search other member PUBLIC trees by:

- Search Tab
- Public Member Trees
- Search for a specific ancestor
- Then View All will give some details but there is no way to contact the public member.

You can search other members PRIVATE trees for free:

- Search Tab
- Public Member Trees
- On the right side there is a link to searching PRIVATE trees. Click Private Trees
- Search for your ancestor.
- In the results, there is a "Contact the Tree Owner" link, but it does not work for free guest accounts.

Potential Ancestors



Ancestry will provide you with potential ancestor hints. In some cases, it will show you what the records are, but they may not be part of the free records you can search.

A strategy would be to go to FamilySearch and look for those same records.

If you can find the records elsewhere, you can verify the family connects and feel confident in adding the Potential Ancestor to your Ancestry tree.





Tip: Use the **Weblink Source** to add a hyperlink to the records you find on FamilySearch or other locations. On Ancestry in the ancestor profile view, in the center Source column, click on Add+ then Weblink. Copy the URL from the other source and put it into the weblink field, name and save. At the bottom of the Source column, you'll see the weblink you just added.

FamilySearch

On FamilySearch you have access to all the U.S. Census records as well as many of the vital records for free. Use FamilySearch as another free research tool for more records and hints.

More Strategies

Your "Go To" Tree

No matter where you put your family tree, decide the one place where your "go to" tree is located. Use that as your main tree where everything resides.

Start a Free Trial

You might find your research is at a point where you want to turn on a Free Trial to get as much as you can that is behind the paywall. Here is an affiliate link for a 14 Free Trial if you wish to start an account.

Canceling a Free Trial

AncestryDNA

If you have taken or are thinking of taking a DNA test, a free guest account is part of the DNA kit cost. Here is an affiliate link, should you wish to take a DNA test.
