

Occupations Tie Records & Ancestors

When conducting genealogical research, one should not overlook occupations. Sometimes occupations can be the key that ties records and family together. At times you may

discover that occupations run in the family, as trades or businesses were handed down from parents to their children.

The **1820 Census** gives clues to ancestor's occupation when the government collected our ancestor's information in one of three categories, **Agriculture, Commerce, Manufacturing**.

Beginning in 1850 occupation information was collected for each adult. According to the <u>Occupations at the Twelfth Census</u>, "Detailed inquiry was made in 1850, for the first time, as to the name, sex, color, age, nativity, etc., of each person enumerated, and in this connection a specific return was required of the profession,

occupation, or trade followed by each free male over 15 years of age.

In **1850**, **1860**, **1870** and **1880** and for those states that took an **1885** census, an agricultural schedule was made. For more on agricultural schedules <u>go here</u>.

Types of occupations you may see are: farmer, seamstress, machinist, miner, fishing, land broker, banking, railroad worker, wood mill, grist mill, judge, clerk, barge pilot, sea captain, deck hand, postal



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worker, dairymen/women, rancher, wood chopper, actors, musicians, engineers, doctors, clergymen, dentists, lawyers, teachers, bartenders, nurses, servants, waiters, soldiers, sailors, marines, watchmen, police, fireman, hunter/trapper, boatmen, store clerk or owner, hotel worker, banks, telegraph office, cabinet maker, drug stores, lumber companies, apparel, book binder, coal workers, boots and shoes, the list goes on.

Free Census forms on FamilySearch shows what information was collected and when.

Additional places to look are trade associations, U.S. Census Agriculture Schedules, military, and religious records.

Using comparison graphs (shown below) can help in tracking the occupation of ancestors and help further our proof of family groups.

The short of it is, don't overlook occupations. They can be as valuable as other evidence in your ancestor's profile. Make sure to note it as a fact in their profile and associate the records that demonstrate it.

How to Add an Occupation & Associate Sources to the Occupation Fact

- Go to the Facts tab in a profile.
- Click +Add
- Scroll down and choose Occupation
- Give a Date Range from the records
- Add a Location
- Note the Occupation in the Description Field.
- On the left click Attach Source.
- Assuming you already have sources in the fact's column, click the green + on the right side to rise the appropriate sources to the top.
- You can attach media if you have previously uploaded an image to the gallery.
- Click the X in the upper right corner to close
